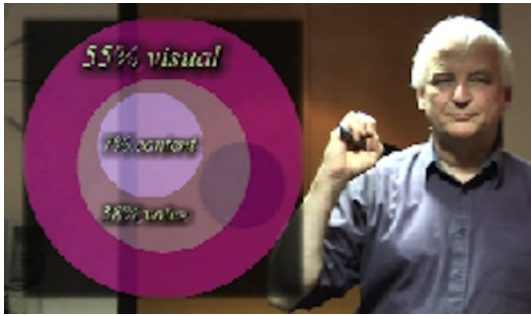


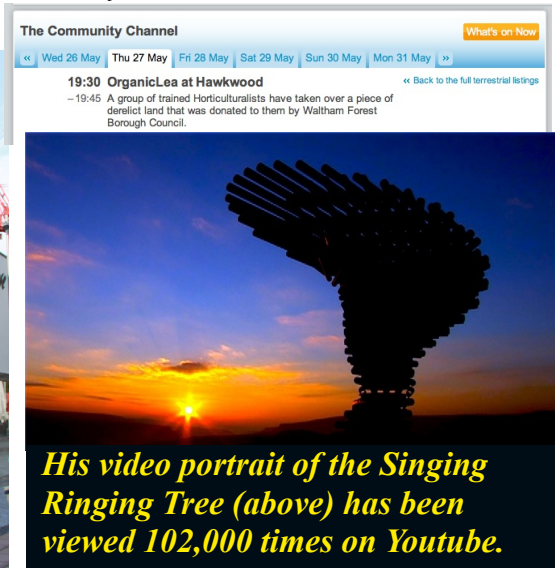
Jonathan Brind's cv November 2013



Jonathan Brind founded and runs Shepherd Videos UK (see <http://www.baa.me.uk>). He is an experienced cameraman (especially with the Sony Z1 and Canon's 7D). He has also been editing videos for many years, latterly using Final Cut Pro X. He often works with Tony Coll, see left, (<http://tonycoll.posterous.com/>) & Michael Dodd (<http://www.michaeldoddcommunications.com>), videoing media training courses. Jonathan Brind also makes corporate videos.



In 2013 he was asked to make a video about the Mallard (the world's fastest ever steam train) for the Science Museum. It is currently widely available on DVD (Amazon etc) and should soon be on iTunes. His video about the impact of the Olympics was shown at the Stratford Picture House in July 2012 as part of the *East End Film Festival*. Another of his videos, about OrganicLea and the Hawkwood Centre, was broadcast several times on Sky's Community Channel.



Jonathan Brind took a National Council for Trainee Journalists based apprenticeship at the Waltham Forest Guardian in the mid 1970s and has worked in newspaper and magazine publishing ever since. He edited a coal industry magazine (between 1983 and 1996, including the coal strike year). While editing a windows magazine (Glass & Glazing Products) between 1998 and autumn 2007, he launched two spin off titles both of which were profitable from the first issue. He is currently a freelance, compiling crosswords and making videos. Born 30/11/1952 in south London. He is divorced, with a son who is a teacher in South Korea and a daughter who teaches science at a specialist school for children with autism in London. For a year he taught shorthand classes twice a week to a group of younger journalists at Unity Media. From 1986 to 1990 he was a London Borough of Waltham Forest councillor, chairing the Planning Committee from 1987 to 1990. This led him to become a member of several powerful cross London bodies including the London Waste Regulation Authority, the London Ecology Authority, the London Boroughs Grants Authority, North East London Waste Authority and various strategic planning bodies. Through the council he became a member of the District Health Authority and was a Mental Health Manager for several years. He also served as a member of a Rate Valuation Tribunal in the late 1980s. He runs three miles about three times a week and is a non-smoker (in fact he introduced Waltham Forest Council's smoking ban 20 years ago, one of the first in the UK).
